


Summer Festival continued . . .


The Board extends our gratitude to Linda Pandol for her efforts in promoting participation and in gathering such a wide variety of items for display from among our mem-

And speaking of championships . . .



Who are these 4 individuals, and what World Championship did they just win?

These four people have just become the first ever World Championship Olive-Picking Team.

Organized by the Croatian Tourist Board, the first ever world championship of olive picking and raking was held just this past weekend, Oct 19-22, in Postira on the Island of Brač. A total of nine countries were represented; they were, in their order of placement: Croatia (winners of the gold), Netherlands, Hungary, New Zea-

land, Montenegro, Greece, Italy, Slovenia, and France. The 2-man 2-woman team of Ivana Gospodnetić, Zoran Gospodnetić, Sanda Gilić, and team captain Tonko Škarić competed in 2 categories of hand-picking and harvesting with rakes and took the title by gathering 107.6 kg of olives; the Netherlands was second place with 86.4 kg. (There must have been a specified time limit ?? But the report from "Total Croatia News" does not say.)

Their prize? "Gold" medals (actually stone medals from the Island of Brač) and bottles of olive oil from the olives they harvested!

Did you "Tie One On"?

Did you remember to celebrate?

One of the many Croatian inventions had its official day on Wednesday, October 18, with the marking of **World Cravat Day**. The forerunner to the modern necktie was indeed the Croatian invention, the 'Cravat'.

Most sartorialists agree that the necktie originated in the 17th century, during the 30 year war in France. King Louis XIII hired Croatian mercenaries who wore a piece of cloth around their neck as part of their uniform. While these early neckties did serve a function (tying the top of their jackets, that is), they also had quite a decorative effect – a look that

King Louis was quite fond of. In fact, he liked it so much that he made these ties a mandatory accessory for Royal gatherings, and – to honor the Croatian soldiers – he gave this clothing piece the name "La Cravate" – a twisted French pronunciation of Croate.

The oldest Croatian portrait of a person wearing a cravat was painted in Dubrovnik in 1622; the portrait depicted the great Croatian poet Ivan Gundulić with a scarf tied around his neck like a cravat.

The Cravat is a Croatian symbol known and recognized worldwide, and since 2008 the 18th of October has been declared

as World Cravat Day by Academia Cravatica, the non-profit group that promotes the cravat as part of the Croatian and world cultural heritage.

The first ever Croatian and European festival dedicated to the necktie was held this year in Zagreb from Oct 14-18. The festival opened with ties being placed on monuments around the city of Zagreb, including on statues of King Tomislav and Ban Josip Jelačić. On Sunday, the 15th, a historical military spectacle was held on the streets of Zagreb

exactly at noon with the Changing of the Guard taking place at St. Mark's Square led by the Kravat Regiment, a special guard of honor. The Kravat Regiment again held the final Changing of the Guard for this festival on European Square (Jelačić Square) on the 18th.

a bright red one, was tied around the ancient Roman Coliseum in Pula, measuring 808 meters long and 25 meters wide at its widest point.

Ties, like other clothing styles, have changed over the years: we have skinny ties, wide ties, striped, solid, plaid, polka-dot, and other patterned ties, designer ties, crazy and funny ties. We have bow ties, and some still love their cravat ties. Many men wish the tie would just
