I have enjoyed writing about SACO's Student Ambassador and Exchange Program's trip to Croatia in the summer of 2022. My first few articles traced our trip from Zagreb to Dubrovnik. As I only have a few more destinations to cover, let's jump right in!

As you may recall, we were staying in Cavtat for the last week of our trip and made a series of daytrips from our base there. One day from Cavtat we took a bus to Cilipi for a day of full-on cultural immersion. We started the day by attending Sunday Mass at the Church of Saint Nicholas (Crkva sv. Nikole). After mass, we attended a craft fair and watched a performance of traditional dancing right outside the doors of the church. On sale at the craft fair were items of lace and traditional woven items handmade by local women.

The traditional dancing was very entertaining and not something that you would see everyday. The male dancers wore white shirts with black vests with red shoes and hats, and the gals had long, full embroidered skirts. Finally, we visited a museum showcasing the history of rural Konavle, the valley where Cilipi is located. I was really excited to see on display a copy of the book, Blossoms into Gold, by Californians Donna and Kathryn Mekis.

For our day trip to the island of Lokrum, we took a ferry from Cavtat. We visited the Benedictine Monastery ruins and the Botanical Gardens. We also saw the iron throne from "Game of Thrones." After lunch, we got to swim in the Adriatic. From Lokrum, we took a ferry to Dubrovnik and walked the walls of the city. I would recommend doing it in the early morning hours, if you can! It was super hot in the afternoon!

Another day trip took us to Sokol Grad, a medieval fortress located in the hills above Dunave. It had a very informative museum that explained its history and displayed many weapons and artifacts. Sokol Grad is just north of Gruda, another town we visited, specifically to see AR Atelier, the art work-

Celebrating a Life of Loyalty and Service



Whether you knew him as Kenny, Sr., Kenneth, Mr. KK, or Grandpa K., we can all agree that there is no life more fulfilled nor more vibrant than the one he lived.

Kenneth John Kovacevich was born in Reedley, California, on June 29, 1928, to parents Lucy (Novak) Kovacevich and Joseph Kovacevich. The middle child of three sons, brother to John and Anton, Kenny was raised and educated in Reedley. He grew up working on his family's farm growing grapes and plums and dreamed of the day that he would have his own farmland. Farming was to become his life-long passion!

Kenny cherished his Croatian heritage and at the age of 18, on March 13, 1949 he paid his \$2.50 initiation fee to begin his membership with the **All Slavonic-American Association.** From that day on his membership never lapsed—he made sure his yearly dues were paid before he went overseas for military duty in January 1951, and his active participation resumed as soon as he returned in late 1952. He remained a loyal and active member for 75 years, longer than any other member on record.

Kenny was fiercely proud of and loyal to his country and served in the US Army during the Korean War. "God Bless America" was a favorite song that Kenny was honored to lead at each ASAA gathering.

Kenny married Mary Ann Zaninovich of Delano in 1955 and the young couple settled in Delano where his dream was realized—they purchased farm land in Earlimart and began their family and the farming operation that continues to this day. He often referred to this time as "the best part of my life." Their union led to a forty-year marriage, and they were blessed with five children: Kenny Jr., Carol, Mark, Marsha, and Ann. Kenny's family has now expanded to include two daughters-in-law, two sons-inlaw, twelve grandchildren, and eleven great-grandchildren.

His first produce label was **MR. KK**, and over the years, Kenny, along with his immediate family, most predominantly grew grapes, but also row crops, persimmons, pomegranates, and almonds. Kenny encouraged his family to work hard, stay together and always be kind to each other.

After his arrival in Delano Kenny also joined the **American Slavonic Social Club** again, a loyal association that would continue throughout his life. His membership spanned 68 years during which he served on the Board of the Slav Club in different capacities. He was on the Board when the Slav Club held their first party in 1958, and most notably served as President for the last thirty-three years!

Kenny was extremely social, loved parties, and looked forward to visits with fellow guests, attending countless celebrations of both Slav organizations. His friendly and gregarious manner made others feel welcomed and at ease. Kenny's page in our ASAA membership ledger book is a testament to his generosity—on his page are listed the names of several gentlemen that were "hosted" or "sponsored" by Kenny over the years—names such as Caric, Slavich, Dulcich, Pandol, Zenovich, and Zaninovich, and others. He was always welcoming and inclusive—if you mentioned an upcoming trip to Croatia, he would be sure to share the contact information for his cousins in Hvar, and urge you to visit them and their restaurant! And he would contact them to let them know you were coming!

Kenny never hesitated to share advice and words of wisdom. Whether it be an impromptu encounter or a scheduled meeting, Kenny was sure to speak these words, "It's nice to say hello", and he meant it! In Kenny's eyes, true success was judged by one's relationships and his loyalty to others.

As a devout Catholic, Kenny embraced his faith and always supported local churches in Delano, Earlimart and Reedley. He particularly enjoyed numerous Croatian celebrations with family and friends at St. Anthony Croatian Church in Los Angeles.

In addition to donating his time and efforts to community causes, such as the Delano Elks Lodge, Kenny liked hunting and fishing, and thoroughly enjoyed traveling, and considered himself fortunate to do so. In his adult years, he loved Las Vegas, making friends with his slot hosts. As participants in gambling tournaments, Kenny and Mary Ann developed valued friendships with folks from all over the country.

After surviving the sudden and sorrowful passing of his wife, Kenny went on to live life to its fullest. He continued to travel, enjoying countless cruises and attending Slav celebrations from Sacramento to L.A.

As a collector of antiques, Kenny's vintage possessions and acquisitions were, and continue to be, proudly displayed on his family's properties. He particularly enjoyed collecting old farming tools and equipment. He graciously made arrangements for his large (and heavy) antique amphora, reclaimed from the Adriatic Sea, to be displayed on two occasions for ASAA artifact displays.

On June 26, 2023, with heavy hearts, we bade farewell to a devoted family man, a successful farmer, a cherished friend, and a Slav brother. We say Doviđenja, and in Kenny's own parting words, we all say to Kenny, "Thank you for your love!"
