John (Ivan) owned/operated a barbershop for many years as well as developed an award-winning Hereford dairy operation. #### The Tom and Martha Slaven Scholarship Program

#### HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS AND COLLEGE STUDENTS WHO MAY APPLY:

- A. A child, grandchild, or great-grandchild of a present member in good standing for at least two full calendar years.
- B. A child, grandchild, or great-grandchild of a deceased member in good standing at the time of demise.
- C. AND who plan to attend a two year or four year accredited college or university. High school graduating seniors and undergraduate college students may apply; Previous ASAA Scholarship winners are ineligible.
- D. Applicants must demonstrate scholastic and extra-curricular achievements, civic accomplishments, and work history (if applicable). The selection committee of the ASAA shall evaluate these with an objective and academic view.

- A. Please mail completed applications to above address by June 1, 2025.
- B. Please provide the name and address of the institution the student will attend, and include the name of the Dean of Admissions, Registrar, or Director of Scholarship Administration, and contact information.

#### **SELECTION COMMITTEE TIMELINE:**

The highest scoring candidates, as scored by the members of the selection committee, will be notified by mail in July. The amounts of the grants for the 2025-2026 academic year will be determined at a later date. These funds will be sent to the successful candidates' colleges in July or August.

## Who <u>Are</u> Those Guys (and gals)? continued

We continue our look at some men and women of historical significance who stand, in stone and bronze, over their communities and nations ...

The Croatian Apoxyomenos ("scraper") is an Ancient Greek statue (sculptor unknown) cast in bronze in the 2nd or 1st century BC; it is the most complete and best preserved among the eight known Apoxyomenos statues. It was found in 1996 by Belgian tourist René Wouters, an avid sports diver who had been visiting Croatia and the island of Lošinj for several years; Wouters discovered the work of art in the sea, near the islet of Vele Orjule, on the sandy bottom between two rocks at a depth of about 148 ft. The find was reported to the Croatian Ministry of Culture in 1998 and the statue was eventually raised by a team of divers from the Ministry of Culture and Archaeological Museum in Zadar, in 1999. Apoxyomenos underwent extensive renovation and in 2006 began a tour of several international museums (including the Getty in California!), but now is in its permanent home at the specially-constructed Museum



of Apoxyomenos in Mali Lošini, Croatia.

Petar Preradović (1818-1872) was a Croatian poet, writer, and military general in the Austro-Hungarian Army. Although his earliest writings were in German, he soon began writing in Croatian only and his poetry was both influenced by and sympathetic to the Illyrian Movement, a South-Slavic political and cultural campaign that aimed to create a Croatian national establishment in Austria-Hungary through linguistic and ethnic unity, i.e. part of a Croatian National Revival. His statue can be found in Preradović Square ("Flower Square") in Zagreb.

Although it is not known exactly when, where, or by whom the procla-

mation or coronation was made. Tomislav had become King of Croatia by 925 A.D., and he was the first Croatian ruler whom the papal chancellery called "king"; he is celebrated

as the first Croatian king and the founder of the first Croatian state. Tomislay is said to have defended mainland Croatia from Hungarian conquest and unified the Croatian nation. This monument, at right, by sculptor Robert Frangeš-Mihanović, was erected in 1927 in Tomislav Square in front of Zagreb Central Station . For those who arrive in Zagreb by train, Tomislav welcomes you.



In the small town of Opatija on the Istrian peninsula is a statue known as the **Maiden with the Seagull**—a woman looking seaward over Kvarner Bay who holds a seagull in her right hand. No one knows who the maiden is supposed to be, but she replaces a previous statue, Madonna del Mar, that was destroyed by a storm. This 1956 statue, by contemporary sculptor Zvonko Car , has in her beauty and simplicity become an iconic symbol of the town of Opatija.

One statue that can be found throughout the Balkan region is that of **Josip Broz Tito**, sculpted by Antun Augustinčić (1900-1979), considered one of the greatest Croatian sculptors of his time. Augustinčić, having completed much of his early studying in Paris, had become a renowned and sought after sculptor not only in the Kingdom of Yugoslavia, but across pre-WWII Europe as well. He became especially known for his commissioned works of government leaders and rulers, including Yugoslavian King Alexander I. In 1943 a bust of Ti-

to, solemn, stoic, with furrowed brow, was completed. That bust having been lost/destroyed in the next 2 years, Augustinčić began in 1947, using his previous inspiration, to develop a full-sized bronze statue of the then leader of Yugoslavia. The work depicts Tito dressed in his uniform and long military trench-coat with nearly the same head from the bust, but this time it is hung low, staring down as he holds in arms behind his back and steps forward. A gust of wind is seen blowing open the lapels of Tito's trench coat, a feature which researcher Vinko Srhoj interprets as a kind of "powerful drapery that opens and frames the power of his stride, dramatizing Tito's physical appearance, its monolithic, slow, yet unstoppable energy of movement. In this sculpture, Augustinčić captures Tito as a true statesman, a portrayal fit for a politician who aims to be understood as the 'father of a nation' ". Shown at right is the original casting of the statue, on display at the museum at Tito's childhood home in Kumrovec, Croatia. Several additional

castings were made (the exact number is unknown) and over the subsequent decades, many more dozens of these full-size reproductions of Augustinčić's concept were erected across Yugoslavia, in all of the Yugoslav Republics, both in public displays and within institutions closed to the public (i.e. military bases, government buildings, etc), as well as among private collections. In fact, there is one casting in Dallas, Texas, on the property of American billionaire real estate mogul Harlan Crow.
