

World Record Strudel

The community of Jaškovo (Karlovac County, Croatia) has set a new world record for the longest line of strudel at their recent Štrudlafest celebration. Actually, the record-setting strudel was a long line of 8,940 *individual* strudels that when assembled end-to-end measured 3,136.84 meters, or 1.949+ miles!



Brussels, Belgium originated the "longest strudel" effort in 2009

with a 704-meter creation; that was topped in 2016 by Jaškovo's 1,479 meter strudel. But Sisak, Croatia responded in 2019 with a 1,762 masterpiece, prompting Jaškovo to attempt to reclaim the record. And reclaim they did, on the 10th anniversary of Strudlafest!

Croatian long-distance swimmer **Dina Levačić** will attempt 2 major swim challenges in the U.S. this Fall. By the time you read this she will likely have completed the first, scheduled for September 28: a 16 km (9 mi.) swim in the waters of Long Island, New York. The other swim, without a specific scheduled date, is the famous crossing from Alcatraz to the San Francisco shoreline, approximately 3 km or 1.8 miles. Weather conditions will play a critical role in the scheduling of this swim. Dina has been training spe-

cifically for the colder water temperatures here in North America, but is certainly no stranger to the demands of long-distance open water swims. In 2023, Levačić was named World Open

Water Swimming Association (WOWSA) Open Water Swimmer of the Year, cementing her status among the sport's greats. You can read more of her accomplishments at croatiaweek.com.



"Our" Nick fondly remembers his years growing up and attending the picnics held by ASAA. He has a multitude of stories to share about those years and the closeness and camaraderie among the many Slavs in the area. He especially remembers the strong moral code with which he was raised, and his father's admonition, "Don't ever lie!" He remembers Slav being spoken among the adults when they didn't want the kids to know what they adults were talking about! And he remembers that his dad placed great importance on his children being a good spellers!



Nick graduated from Reedley High School and began studies at the University of San Francisco (primarily because his older sister Patricia was attending there and she had a car!) and at the Art Institute of San Francisco. He then transferred to Brooks Institute of Photography in Santa Barbara where he earned a Bachelors of Professional Art. Upon returning to the Valley he made his career

in professional photography, specializing in agricultural photography of produce. Did you know that each patent application for a new hybrid or new varietal must be accompanied by specific photographic records? Nick has been the photographer for patent applications of over 450 different varieties of produce, as well as photography for commercial advertising in the produce industry. Occasionally he also did home interiors photos that have appeared in architectural and design magazines. And once he was back in the valley, he became an active ASAA member.

Nick and the late Lucille Carić were married at St. Mary's Church in Delano in 1983 and they made their home in Dinuba. The couple welcomed 4 children during their marriage: 2 girls and 2 boys, each with careers in various California locations. His closest daughter, location-wise, is nearby in Clovis, and she is the mother to Nick's 2 grandchildren.

In his free time Nick enjoys golfing and attending Fresno State Bulldog games, and he has proven invaluable in helping organize the kitchen crews for our Fresno Festivals, most recently this year! Nick is a treasure trove of information re: some of the earlier days of ASAA, and has many more stories to tell.

Who Do You Think You Are?

Nick Buratovich has been a life-long member of ASAA, as were his father and grandfather before him. He recently shared with us his story and his Croatian roots:

On the highest hill of the island of Hvar sits the village of Vrbanj. It is in this village, in the late 1800's, where Nickola Buratović, a wine producer, and his wife Perina raised their family of 8 children. The second-oldest child made the decision to emigrate to America, and



so Tomas Buratović, along with his best friend Pete Pavicić-Donkić, left home in 1905 and eventually boarded the *RMS Carpathia*, bound from Trieste, Italy to New York. The pair arrived in 1906, and traveled by rail to Oakland, California where they sought work. Thomas was Nick's grandfather; he found work as a dishwasher at a restaurant, worked his way up to serve as a cook, and eventually became manager. After just a few years, Tomas asked Pete about his younger sister—would she like to come to America? Tomas offered to pay the passage for Jakica to make the journey, and there would be no need to re-pay the cost if she would agree to become Tomas' wife. So Jakica Pavicić sailed to the US in 1911, but she didn't come alone—making the voyage with her was her best friend Magdalena. And, you guessed it — Jakica and Tomas wed in 1912, and Pete and Magdalena tied the knot soon after. True BFFs — the two couples forged a strong bond that was life-long.

Their lives were blessed, but Tomas had a yearning to be back working the land as he did with his father in Vrbanj. By 1920 Tomas, Jakica, and their three children were living in Fresno and Tomas was working on his own fruit tree farm. We are confident that Tomas became a member of ASAA at that time. During the next the decade the family welcomed another son, and Tomas owned two ranches with fruit trees and grapes. The end of that decade, however, saw the collapse of the economy, the beginning of the Depression, and the loss of the ranches. This prompted the family's move to Dinuba where Tomas continued to work in agriculture. He found employment with Vincent Zaninovich (VBZ), soon becoming ranch foreman. In 1940, when VBZ made the decision to move to Delano, the offer to buy the Dinuba ranch was extended to Tomas.



The deal was completed and Tomas owned his own farm again, and now he had his older son Nick to work the farm with him. Nick had been born in Oakland in 1915 and graduated from Dinuba High School, but higher education was forfeited for the role of helping his father run the ranch.

This son Nick ("our" Nick's father) continued to work with his father Tomas while also developing a fruit packing enterprise in the Reedley/ Dinuba area, and he joined with other Slavs in the area in membership of the ASAA. In June of 1943 Nick and Evelyn Friesen were married; they made their home in rural Reedley and to them were born three children: Patricia, Nick (born 1949), and Mike.

Meet Our Scholarship Recipients ... the A.S.A.A. Tom and Martha Slaven Scholarship Program



Milana Smith is the daughter of Maryanne Slaven Smith and grand-daughter of Martha and the late Tom Slaven. She has been awarded the *Katherine Maikovich Berger Scholarship* in the amount of \$2,000. She is a graduate of South Sutter IEM Charter School (Sacramento area) where she maintained a 3.6 GPA, was a member of the National Honor Society, Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society, and received the California State Seal of Bi-literacy in American Sign Language.

She is a member of the St. Stephen's Catholic Church Choir, plays piano and organ, and holds a first degree black belt from Kovar's Satori Academy of Martial Arts. She was a team leader at Camp Immaculate Heart and has pursued advanced study in American Sign Language.

She graduated from Clovis North High School, earning a 3.6 GPA while competing on their National Winning cheer team all four years and garnering numerous accolades: State Championship and 3-time Valley Champions; Brynlee served as team captain her senior year.

As part of the Career and Technical Education program at Clovis North Brynlee volunteered at Maple Creek Elementary helping in the Kindergarten classroom. Outside of the classroom she was a competition cheer coach for Fugman Elementary for three years and also often vol-
